### WELCOME TO KINOTEKA 20!

In the face of pandemic-related setbacks, Polish cinema has proven to be resilient across the past year. In spite of an initial three-month closure of film sets in early 2020 – as well as a near three-quarter drop in cinema admissions and gross box office – films continued to be produced in Poland. By the end of 2020, a total of 72 full-length films were completed. At the 20th Kinoteka Polish Film Festival, it is our pleasure to present an exciting programme full of new productions, alongside curated Polish classics and a singular cinematic journey into the virtual world.

The festival gets underway at the ICA with our Opening Night Gala screening of *Silent Land*, a mysterious, slow-burning portrait of guilt and denial. This confident debut feature opens up a complex dialogue about morality and incorporates the migrant crisis in Europe.

Our New Polish Cinema strand takes place at Riverside Studios, the ICA, JW3, Edinburgh Filmhouse and The Prince Charles Cinema. This year, a wide-ranging assortment of nine films brings together true and fictional stories in a display of the emotional strength of the contemporary cinema landscape in Poland. Nostalgia - both for the communist era and the 1990s – is on the mind of the directors of Back Then and Back to Those Days, while the theme of injustice drives Leave No Traces, 25 Years of Innocence and The Death of Zvaielboim. Meanwhile, comedy of characters The In-Laws and dark thriller A Woman at Night highlight the sheer of creativity of the Polish film industry.

The programme continues with our longstanding partner the BFI. After its success at last year's online festival, BFI Player will once again host a selection of 20th-century Polish film. The Polish Cinema Classics strand showcases well-established, classic films as *The Maids of Wilko* (1979) and *How to Be Loved* (1963) alongside the likes of *Sexmission* (1984) and *Pigs* (1992), cult films in Poland that have only had a limited overseas release. The importance of Poland's women directors is also foregrounded, with Agnieszka Holland's lesser-known sophomore feature *Fever* (1981) and the outstanding but underappreciated Barbara Sass's debut *Without Love* (1980).

As part of our commitment to interactive events that push the boundaries of film, we present *VR Nightsss* in collaboration with the ICA. This immersive, sensory-kinetic experience brings together poetry, dance and nature via virtual reality. The ICA also screens the documentary *1970*, a unique combination of archival photography, telephone conversations and stop-motion animation, which explores the violent events that took place in Poland in December 1970.

Our Closing Night Gala draws the curtain on this year's festival with a screening of the 1924 silent film *Forbidden Paradise*, accompanied by an atmospheric live score led by composer Marcin Pukaluk.

After this difficult period for cinema-goers, we are delighted to welcome you back to the festival. We encourage you all to delve into the best of Polish cinema and culture with us.

After arriving at a holiday villa on an Italian island, bourgeois couple Adam (Dobromir Dymecki) and Anna (Agnieszka Żulewska) discover that the swimming pool is empty. The migrant worker sent to fix it suffers a deadly poolside accident, setting off a chain of disturbing events that shake the moral foundations of this seemingly-perfect couple. Aesthetically sparse, with minimal dialogue and an enigmatic plot, Agnieszka Woszczyńska's debut feature is a slowburning character study that unfurls the power of denial. Silent Land debuted at the Toronto International Film Festival, before picking up the FIPRESCI award for the International Competition at the Thessaloniki International Film Festival.

# THE BEST RELEASES FROM A TUMULTUOUS YEAR IN FILMMAKING

The year 2020 brought with it a plethora of setbacks for the global film industry. Owing to health and safety concerns (and the accompanying new regulations), film shoots were delayed and, in some cases, even cancelled. This often had a knock-on effect for crew members, leading to longer-term financial and psychological worries. For those shoots that had already wrapped, cinema closures awaited, with no clear path to distribution. Meanwhile, producers seeking to finance new projects were left with a dearth of options, as traditional funding sources shied away, waiting for the pandemic dust to settle.

In Poland, this was no different. Along with the rest of the EU, the country saw a weighty drop in cinema admissions and gross box office takings. Coupled with cinema closures at various points across the year, this meant that 2020 was a much slower year for Polish cinema. Indeed, this was reflected in the reduced programme of last year's Kinoteka film festival.

This year, we are able to showcase the fruits of the past year in Polish film-making, thanks largely to the efforts of crews, producers and actors across the country. Leave No Traces, Poland's entry for Best International Feature Film at this year's Academy Awards, received a last-minute but much-needed boost thanks to additional French investment. On the other hand, 25 Years of Innocence had finished shooting prior to the pandemic, but faced an uncertain autumn 2020 release – its box office success is largely predicated on the strength of


its script, performances, and the moving story it depicts. In the case of *The In-Laws*, a tight 17-day shoot surely helped its chances. Many more Polish productions have been realised across the pandemic, including 90s nostalgia (*Back to Those Days*) and biopics (*Sonata*). The results are impressive – and pave the way for a rejuvenated, post-pandemic film industry.

#### **XK LEAVE NO TRACES**

Matuszyński Writer: Kaja Krawczyk-Wnuk Cast: Tomasz Ziętek, Sandra Korzeniak, Jacek Braciak Poland/Czech Republic/France, 2021, 160 min In 1983, communist Poland is still under martial law. After being arrested and beaten by the police, Grzegorz Przemyk, son of the opposition poet Barbara Sadowska (Sandra Korzeniak), dies. The only witness, Jurek Popiel (Tomasz Ziętek), decides to testify against the police, bringing the weight of the state against him. Based on Cezary Łazarewicz's award-winning reportage of the same name, *Leave No Traces* is a moving picture of the injustices of the late communist era in Poland. The film won three awards at the Gdynia Polish Film Festival, and was selected to compete for the Golden Lion at Venice Film Festival.

While the guests drink and make merry, simmering tensions emerge between the in-laws of the wouldbe newlyweds. Thus the stage is set for an explosion of resentments across the social and economic divide in this keenly-observed comedy of characters. *The In-Laws* took home the Audience Award at the Vancouver International Film Festival.

He tries to earn a living writing rap lyrics, lives in his mother's apartment and is in on-and-off relationship with Aneta (Magdalena Koleśnik). When their paths cross, Iwona and Kamil will begin to see everything around them in a different light. An award-winning rap opera adapted from Dorota Masłowska's novel of the same name. Other People shows the author's peculiar idiosyncratic vision of an increasingly atomised society. The film features adult content, including sex and violence, and is not suitable for younger viewers.

Yet no one believes that he will achieve this – except for his mother (Małgorzata Foremniak) and father (Łukasz Simlat). The film won both the Audience Award and Best Debut Actor at the Gdynia Polish Film Festival.

#### **XK 25 YEARS OF INNOCENCE**

The life of 23-year-old Tomasz Komenda (Piotr Trojan) is upended when he is arrested and charged with the rape and murder of a teenager. After being found guilty, he is sentenced to 25 years in prison, where he is regularly beaten and humiliated. After 18 years, police officer Remigiusz Korejwo (Dariusz Chojnacki) looks into the case and discovers that Komenda has been dealt an irreparable injustice. Based on real events. 25 Years of Innocence is an unflinching analysis of how justice can become perverted. This debut feature took home 15 awards across the festival circuit, including multiple wins at the Polish Film Awards and the Gdynia Polish Film Festival.

In May 1943, Szmul Zygielbojm (Wojciech Mecwaldowski), a member of the Polish government-in-exile, commits suicide in London. This leads young British journalist Adam (Jack Roth) to follow the coroner's investigation, in doing so revealing the significance of Zygielbojm's mission in Great Britain: to convince the indifferent Allies to intervene in the Holocaust being perpetrated by Nazi Germany in Europe. An account of a true historical tragedy, *The Death of Zygielbojm* is a timely reminder that we must always take evil seriously – and act against it.

After the collapse of communism, Alek (Maciej Stuhr) migrates from Wrocław to the US, leaving his son Tomek (Teodor Koziar) to live alone with mother Helena (Weronika Książkiewicz). One day, Alek unexpectedly returns home with gifts for his family. Yet alongside the colour television set and Lego blocks, the father is bringing something much darker into the household... Back to Those Days is in many ways a love letter to the 1990s, unafraid to present both the pleasures and difficulties of the era. The film took part in the main competition at the Gdynia Polish Film Festival.

**XK** 1970

Director: Tomasz Wolski Writer: Tomasz Wolski Poland, 2021, 70 min In December 1970, a series of strikes and riots took place in northern Poland in protest against the sudden increase in price of basic groceries. In response, the communist government sent in the army and police to put a violent end to the demonstrations. The documentary 1970 draws upon archival photography, recently-discovered telephone conversations and stop-motion animation to better understand why the Polish authorities took the actions that they did. In doing so, Tomasz Wolski creates a precise picture about what power is and how its mechanisms function, opening up a universal discussion that encapsulates the use of force by present-day governments across the globe.

# POLISH CINEMA CLASSICS





It is exciting, therefore, to be able to present, across the UK, a section of newly digitised titles from two of the most important film studios in Poland. From the first film by Jerzy Skolimowski, to Andrzej Żuławski's enigmatic cult masterpiece and one of the top 10 Polish comedies of all time, these titles represent a diverse panorama across film history in mid-late 20th century Poland.

KADR Studio was the oldest state owned film studio, founded in 1955. It offered an unique structure for artists to develop their work and aside from being the original home to the Polish Film School, offered the creative space for directors including Sass, Holland, Kutz and Has to make films, many of which since became recognised as ground breaking contributions to cinematic history. Recognising the importance of this history KADR became involved in digital remastering from 2008.

Since 1988, when Juliusz Machulski set up Zebra Film Studio, the company made over 30 films. Directors working here included Władysław Pasikowski and Piotr Szulkin. They have prioritised preserving Poland's cultural heritage by both restoring and digitising their catalogue in consultation with the film-makers.

Many studios were merged into the new Documentary and Feature Film Production Company in 2019. Under this umbrella the preservation of cultural heritage has continued enabling us to share with you titles that confirm the richness of Polish cinema in this programme. Start exploring... →

#### **XK** HOW TO BE LOVED

Director: Wojciech Jerzy Has Writer: Kazimierz Brandys Cast: Barbara Krafftówna, Zbigniew Cybulski, Wieńczysław Gliński Poland, 1963, 97 min

From Wojciech Jerzy Has, the director of the dazzling The Saragossa Manuscript, this early low key work (presented in Cannes competition) from his Polish Film School period explores the effects of WW2 on the Polish psyche. Adapted by Kazimierz Brandys from his own story the film is distinct in its depiction of the German Occupation from a female perspective.

Barbara Krafftówna gives a compelling performance as Felicia, an actress struggling to reconcile personal choices and her career as she travels from Warsaw to Paris for the first time in years. Poland's James Dean, Zbigniew Cybulski, appears as her former lover. His larger than life character (and boastful stories) reveals the vulnerability of ordinary people in the theatre of war and leaves us to consider the individual human tragedies that happen in that arena every day.

Acclaimed by Jean-Luc Godard, Jerzy Skolimowski's feature debut (which won him two Best Director prizes) was made on a very restricted budget whilst he was still at the Łódź Film School.

It introduces Andrzej Leszczyc (a character to appear in subsequent films) on the anniversary of the outbreak of WW2 as he prepares to join the army, having given up his studies and left his girlfriend, Theresa. Feeling at odds with society, this outsider (played by Skolimowski himself) is, like many others of his generation, uncomfortable with his position and trying to find his way in life. Rising star, Elżbieta Czyżewska, plays the three different women on his journey.

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#### COMFDY DRAMA

#### **XK** THE BEADS OF ONE ROSARY

Amateurs were cast in the main roles in this final segment of Kazimierz Kutz' Silesian trilogy, which began with *Salt of the Black Earth* in 1969. With an affectionate script, adapted from the novel by Albin Siekierski, the film unfolds revealing the final days of a culture built on community, shared values and working class solidarity.

Retired miner Karol Habryka fights strongly to retain his family home, shunning the concrete tenements that are rising up outside his door. Telling the story with affection and humour, legendary director Kutz (as renowned for his work in theatre, TV and in politics as in cinema) keenly observes everyday life and the cross-generational arguments, with all their contractions, that bind families together. Winning the top award at the Polish Film Festival in Gdansk 1980 and a special award at Karlovy Vary *The Beads of One Rosary* subsequently screened at many international film festivals.



#### ROMANTIC DRAMA

#### **XK** THE YOUNG LADIES OF WILKO

Having received his first major break as an actor with (the now internationally renowned) Andrzej Wajda, Daniel Olbrychski continued to appear in his films and took the lead in this elegiac tale of 1920s Poland. Often described as 'Chekhovian" *The Young Ladies of Wilko* is based on a story by Jarosław Iwaszkiewicz in which a young man in crisis re-visits a place that holds many happy memories and discovers how things have changed.

The enigmatic story is a meditation on life, (a change of pace from Wajdas preceding political films) unfolding around the women on the Wilko farm. Filmed on location, designed by Allan Starski (also a long term collaborator with Wajda) the film was nominated for Best Foreign Language Film Oscar and enjoyed success abroad, including festivals in New York and Locarno.



#### PSYCHOLOGICAL DRAMA

#### **XK WITHOUT LOVE**

Winning the award for best directorial feature debut at the Polish Film Festival in 1980 Without Love marked the arrival of the distinct talent of Barbara Sass. Positioning strong, independent contemporary women centre stage, acknowledging their flaws, she made a significant impact on the male dominated Polish culture.

Ewa, a young journalist (brilliantly played by Dorota Stalińska) knows no boundaries in pushing forwards her career. Crashing through all the gender stereotypes she is nonetheless forced to reflect on her behaviour when a young woman's life is put at risk. A tough and uncompromising slice of social realism shot by distinguished cinematographer Wiesław Zdort this film was the first of three by Sass to star Stalińska, challenging perceptions of female centred cinema.

Seweryn Krajewski's striking score adds to the tension in this memorable psychological drama.



#### HISTORICAL DRAMA

#### **XK** FEVER

Following the success of her debut feature, *Provincial Actors*, Agnieszka Holland made *Fever*, based on a story by Andrzej Strug. However, soon after its release martial law was declared in Poland and the Polish Communist government banned it. Focusing on Polish resistance to Russian forces at the time of the 1905 Revolution *Fever* shows a period of complex relationships through inter-woven stories. The narrative follows a series of individuals who work collaboratively towards taking down the old order (specifically a much hated Russian Governor-General) and the journey of the bomb that they hope will be decisive in their struggle.

Acclaimed for many outstanding performances, watch out for Bogusław Linda, who appears as an anarchist in his first major role (a key part in Holland's *A Woman Alone* was soon to follow) and Barbara Grabowska, who won the Silver Bear for Best Actress at the Berlin Film Festival.

### XK THE WAR OF THE WORLDS: NEXT CENTURY

Described by the Lincoln Centre in 2019 as "a disturbingly prescient allegory of power, control, and media manipulation in a post-truth world" Piotr Szulkin's sci-fi drama opens just before the dawn of 21st century. Based on H G Wells' novel (1898) it was completed just before General Jaruzelski imposed martial law on Poland. Taking the themes, rather than the details, of Wells' work it explores how the authorities use the invasion of Martians to increase their power, manipulating the media and providing populist entertainment.

This was Szulkin's second feature, preceded by his debut *Golem* (1979), considered a Polish Sci-Fi classic.

The acclaimed Krystyna Janda (known for her work with Andrzej Wajda) was cast as the wife of central character Iron Idem, a news presenter played by Roman Wilhelmi, himself a hugely popular TV series actor at the time.



#### SCI-FI. COMEDY

#### XK SEXMISSION

Hugely popular with Polish audiences on release and considered one of the top 10 Polish comedies of all time, *Sexmission* is a smart satire of a totalitarian state.

Inspired by Stanley Kubrick (wanting to work in every genre) emerging writer-director Juliusz Machulski shook up expectations and packed cinemas with this sci-fi tale of two men waking up from hibernation in 2044, decades later than expected, to find themselves in an underground post nuclear world of women.

Jerzy Stuhr, then associated with the cinema of moral anxiety and for his work with Krzysztof Kieślowski, was cast against type as Max. Doctor Berna, the head of the archaeological institute was played by Beata Tyszkiewicz, known as the Eastern Catherine

A few years later Machulski changed focus and become a producer, founding the Zebra film studio, to develop films from a wide range of genres.



### SCI-FI, DRAMA

#### **XK ON THE SILVER GLOBE**

Poland, 1988, 157 min

Ostensibly shut down in 1977 because the production was going over budget Andrzej Żuławski's epic soon gained cult status as an unfinished masterpiece. Adapted from (his great-uncle) Jerzy Żuławski's influential *The Lunar Trilogy* (only recently available in English) its turbulent history has generated numerous myths and documentaries seeking to explain it. Always uncompromising, the futuristic labyrinthine narrative explores the dangers of polarised politics and observes a new society growing on an alien planet.

Now available in its restored form with striking, often violent images (made more impactful by the often feverish hand held shooting style) and powerful music by regular collaborator Andrzej Korzyński it can be seen as the philosophical exploration of the true nature of mankind that Żuławski intended.



#### CRIMF DRAMA

#### **XK PIGS**

Life on the streets is brutal as ex secret police officer Franz Maurer (Bogusław Linda) is 'downgraded' to an ordinary policeman and has to adjust to his new status. Often compared to Tarantino for his bloody scenes and gallows humour director Władysław Pasikowski declared he was aiming to make a popular film: he had a huge commercial success and created a popular icon with the character of Maurer, who has since returned in two further *Pigs* films.

Shot by multi-award winning cinematographer Pawel Edelman (in a very different style to that used by him on Wajda's films) we are drawn into a world of ambiguous moral guidelines, mirroring the difficulties of adjustment in post-Communist Poland. The dark reality of everyday life is put centre stage in this gritty urban thriller which remains popular in Poland today.

# VIRTUAL REALITY IMMERSIVE VR EXPERIENCES



Virtual reality (or VR) is taking leaps and bounds in the world of cinema. This technology, which refers to a simulated experience of reality, transmitted through a headset, enables artists and directors alike to explore the spatial dimension of film - something that is difficult to achieve within the usual two-dimensional confines of the cinema screen. Often associated with video games, VR is being increasingly embraced by international auteurs. 2017 saw the release of Alejandro González Iñárritu's Carne y arena, which takes users in the footsteps of Mexican and Central American refugees as they approach the US border; just last year, Asif Kapadia debuted Laika, a short about the famous Soviet canine's expedition into space. One thing is for sure: in the coming years, VR is set to revolutionise how we all experience cinema.

Young military officer Alexei (Rod La Rocque) rescues Catherine (Pola Negri), the Czarina of a small kingdom in Eastern Europe, from a group of revolutionaries who are plotting against her. The Czarina 'rewards' him in the bedroom, causing Alexei to fall head over heels in love with her, only to find out that he is far from the only royal consort. Stung, Alexei joins a rebellion against the monarchy, vowing that no harm will come to Catherine. But the rakish Chancellor (Adolphe Menjou) has plans to quash this new threat.

Made during the golden era of Hollywood silent cinema, Forbidden Paradise is a wonderful comic drama adapted from a 1922 Broadway play, starring the much-loved Polish performer Pola Negri, alongside an early cameo from Clark Gable.

We are pleased to present the most complete version of *Forbidden Paradise* in almost 100 years, thanks to a new digital restoration by the Museum of Modern Art and The Film Foundation, with funding provided by the George Lucas Family Foundation.

The screening of Forbidden Paradise will be accompanied by a live score performed by Marcin Pukaluk, a composer, performer and producer who has previously scored titles including *The Cabinet of Dr. Caligari* (1920), *The General* (1926), and *Metropolis* (1927) for an array of international film festivals.




